RE: Support for AB 33 (Bains)—Fentanyl Addiction and Overdose Prevention Task Force

Dear Assemblymember Bains,

On behalf of the City of Long Beach, I write in support of AB 33. This bill would establish the Fentanyl Addiction and Overdose Prevention Task Force. The task force would collect and organize data on fentanyl abuse in California and evaluate the state's progress in preventing fentanyl abuse and death. Furthermore, the task force would develop policy recommendations on the implementation of evidence-based practices to reduce fentanyl overdoses and would develop model treatment protocols for medication-assisted treatment. AB 33 aligns with the City's objectives to support legislation that assists municipalities in combatting opioid overdose.

Fentanyl-related overdose deaths in California have increased dramatically in recent years. Between 2012 and 2018, fentanyl overdose deaths increased by more than 800 percent—from 82 to 786. In 2021, there were 5,961 deaths in California related to fentanyl overdoses. Given the serious threat to the safety and wellbeing of the Long Beach community, the Long Beach City Council adopted a [resolution](#) on November 7, 2022, acknowledging fentanyl and opioid overdoses as a public health crisis. The City of Long Beach is committed to working collaboratively to develop policies that prevent opioid abuse and overdose, such as the City's Narcan distribution policy aimed at establishing guidelines, instructions, and procedures for administering Narcan. Similarly, AB 33 would bring together public health officials, healthcare providers, and law enforcement to coordinate an effective response to reduce fentanyl-related overdoses statewide.

AB 33 would strengthen state and local efforts in responding to fentanyl abuse by increasing public awareness; assessing gaps in federal, state, and local resources to address fentanyl addiction; and analyzing existing laws for their adequacy in addressing fentanyl abuse. For these reasons, the City supports AB 33.
