Subject: **Priority Project Funding Requests List**

Over the past two years, the City of Long Beach (City) has submitted priority projects to the legislative delegation for direct funding through the state and federal budget processes, successfully receiving \$57.45 million in earmarks. While the state is currently forecasting a \$22.5 billion shortfall and is unlikely to provide resources for district spending in this budget cycle, the incoming Congress voted to retain congressionally directed spending this session.

Members have very limited opportunities to put forward district projects for direct spending. Earmarks are generally restricted to projects that are shovel-ready or currently in progress and have a minimal funding gap between \$1-3 million that can be expended within a 12- to 18-month period. Projects also must align with eligible funding categories and appropriations bills.

We have prepared the attached list of priority projects that the City is working on to send to the entire delegation for consideration for direct funding opportunities, as well as grants and other resources that may be available at the state and federal levels. While these funding opportunities are extremely competitive—and legislators may pursue other projects that have an opportunity to be funded—the list provides a baseline of ongoing City projects that might fit the limited eligibility for direct funding.

City Facilities

- *Citywide Closed-circuit Television Systems*
 - Project Summary: Replace existing, technically obsolete closed-circuit television systems and add fiber to improve connection speeds for security cameras and improve quality of current Wi-Fi in the Park locations. Will advance community safety and quality of internet connection for park users.
 - Funding Requested: \$1,200,000
 - Project Location: Citywide
 - Delegation Members: All

- *Crime Lab*
 - Project Summary: The City is in the process of acquiring 125 Elm St., to provide space for a variety of City needs including the Long Beach Police Department's Crime Lab and Warehouse. Since 2001, the City has leased warehouse space for a crime lab, and the lease is set to expire in 2026. A City-owned facility would allow for upgrades to accommodate the needs of the crime lab.
 - Funding Requested: \$7,000,000
 - Project Location: Council District 1
 - Delegation Members: Congressmember Garcia, Senator Gonzalez, Assemblymember Lowenthal

- *Fire Academy Rebuild*
 - Project Summary: This project would replace the existing Fire Academy Office, which is a 40-year-old trailer, with a multi-purpose modular structure. The new LEED-certified structure will include expanded classroom and office space and workforce privacy features, such as multiple gender-neutral restrooms. The Regional Training Center hosts state-certified courses in Urban Search and Rescue, Hazardous Materials response, and other topics for fire staff throughout the region; ongoing drills and training for Long Beach Department first responders; and the Long Beach Fire Department's Recruit Academy.
 - Funding Requested: \$25,000,000
 - Funding Allocated: \$800k from Measure A
 - Project Location: Council District 4
 - Delegation Members: Congressmember Garcia, Senator Gonzalez, Assemblymember Lowenthal

- *Fire Station 9 Rebuild*

- Project Summary: This project would allow for the planning, design, and construction of a replacement for Fire Station 9 on a 0.4-acre property located at 4101 Long Beach Boulevard. The proposed project includes a new 12,656-square-foot (sf), two-story fire station with three drive-through apparatus bays. The apparatus space will include a workshop, medical storage and clean-up, turnout storage, and related janitorial facilities. The building's apparatus bays would be able to accommodate a Type 1 fire engine, a rescue company, and a battalion chief vehicle. The station would have additional storage capacity for a reserve Type 3 engine in the apparatus bay and a fire truck in the rear of the station. The station building's 7,120 sf second level would include living quarters for fire personnel and offices for the battalion chief and captains. There will be onsite parking for the fire personnel on duty.

 - Funding Allocated: \$6.6M from Measure A

- *Health Facilities Improvements*

- Project Summary: The City's Department of Health and Human Services is focused on upstream, multi-generation collective impact work across focus areas such as early childhood, older adults, violence prevention, and climate change preparedness and action. As the institutional convener and organizer of local public health efforts, aging physical infrastructure at the City's public health facilities—including Main, Central, and West Health facilities and Miller Family Health Education Center—limits the City's ability to provide access to essential services and to improve health outcomes. Recent renovations at the North Health Facility located in Houghton Park made the space feel safer and more welcoming, while housing HIV/STI preventative and clinical services closer to residents in North Long Beach. Funding is needed to support significant maintenance improvements, including exterior and interior renovation, façade improvement, and exterior landscaping.

- Project Location: Council Districts 4, 5, 6, 7, 9

- *Queen Mary*

- Project Summary: Funding would support capital projects and structural repairs essential to prepare the Queen Mary for visitors once the pandemic

ends, allowing the iconic site to exceed pre-pandemic economic impact levels and support tourism and economic development for Pier H's cruise ship, hotel, charter boat, and restaurant operations. Improvements include plumbing, electrical/lighting, paint restoration, HVAC, and more.

 - Project Location: Council District 1

- *Senior Center Facility*
 - Project Summary: The current Senior Center of 4th St has been identified as a facility requiring significant upgrades in order to function long-term. With the acquisition of 125 Elm St., the City will be able to develop a more modern and well-planned Senior Center at a new location in the heart of the downtown area adjacent to transit and other amenities. Funding is needed to renovate the site to include several multi-purpose rooms, a community meeting room, a small restaurant and office space for the Senior Center, and Health Department staff to provide supportive services to the senior community.
 - Funding Requested: \$8,700,000
 - Project Location: Council District 1
 - Delegation Members: Congressman Garcia, Senator Gonzalez, Assemblymember Lowenthal

Infrastructure

- *ADA Accessibility Improvements*
 - Project Summary: The City has been engaged in a number of significant accessibility improvements. On October 17, 2017, after over three years of litigation and negotiations, a class action settlement agreement was approved to make the City of Long Beach's sidewalks, crosswalks, and other pedestrian pathways safer and more accessible for people with disabilities. Part of the settlement requires the City to install and repair thousands of curb ramps and sidewalks. The City received authorization from the State to award design-build contracts to expedite these improvements. Funding will help the City implement critical ADA improvements and accessibility citywide. Funding is also requested to continue expanding accessibility to our coastal areas through ADA beach-access mats.
 - Funding Requested: \$8,000,000
 - Project Location: Citywide
 - Delegation Members: All

- *Alamitos Beach Parking*
 - Project Summary: Alamitos Beach is the most parking impacted area in the City of Long Beach, both for residential and commercial purposes. The City has engaged in numerous technical studies to identify parking solutions, including restriping of parking spaces, creating ongoing revenue streams, encouraging private use of property for public parking, and purchase and conversion of properties to parking. Funding is needed to secure additional property and convert them to public parking lots.
 - Funding Requested: \$3,000,000
 - Project Location: Council District 2
 - Delegation Members: Congressmember Garcia, Senator Gonzalez, Assemblymember Lowenthal

- *Cultural Centers*
 - Project Summary: The City has several concurrent cultural efforts in various stages of development, including African American, Cambodian, and Latino Cultural Centers, and the LGBTQ+ District. These respective Centers and District have a full staffing team assigned to oversee the progress toward bringing these spaces from planning to construction to opening. The limitation of these spaces at this time is dedicated funding needed to establish permanent facilities for the Cultural Centers and complete placemaking and improvements for the LGBTQ+ District.
 - Funding Requested: \$5,000,000
 - Project Location: Various
 - Delegation Members: All

- *Studebaker Road Corridor*
 - Project Summary: Studebaker Road is a major regional east-west travel corridor. The Studebaker Road Corridor Project will improve Studebaker and Loynes Drive for all modes of transportation, rehabilitating the pavement, constructing a transit boarding island, separating existing bike lanes from traffic with curbs, shortening pedestrian crossing distances, and adding high-visibility crosswalks, upgrading traffic signals, and connecting the entire corridor with fiber optic communications.
 - Funding Requested: \$3,000,000
 - Funding Allocated: \$7,300,000 from restricted sources
 - Project Location: Council Districts 3, 4, 5
 - Delegation Members: Congressmember Garcia, Senator Gonzalez, Assemblymember Lowenthal

- *Worst Streets and Alleys Improvements*
 - Project Summary: The City has extensive street improvement needs for the worst and most visibly deteriorated streets. Funding will allow the City to address a need unlikely to be addressed without external support due to the high cost and competing street improvement program interests. The City has invested more than \$5.6 million for the Worst Streets & Alleys Program; however, there is still a significant funding gap.
 - Funding Requested: \$20,000,000
 - Funding Allocated: \$5.6M as part of the FY 21 Budget Adoption to fund streets and alleys.
 - Project Location: Citywide
 - Delegation Members: All

Parks and Open Space

- *51st Street Greenbelt*
 - Project Summary: The Project will transform nearly one acre of undeveloped land in a dense, park-poor, disadvantaged community of color into a thriving Greenbelt for multigenerational users that improves water and air quality, increases tree canopy and new park acreage, and reduces greenhouse gas emissions in the air. It will also provide an improved connection to the adjacent DeForest Wetlands. The project will add a natural walking path and bioswales with native, drought tolerant plants. While the City secured \$2M from Congressman Barragan, an additional \$1.45M is needed to cover the design and construction for the full project, including the recreational play and fitness elements.
 - Funding Requested: \$1,450,000
 - Funding Allocated: \$2M from Congressman Barragan through the FY 23 federal budget.
 - Project Location: Council District 8
 - Delegation Members: Congressman Barragan, Senator Gonzalez, Assemblymember Lowenthal
- *Bixby Park*
 - Project Summary: Bixby Park needs additional funding to complete work already planned for the park. Areas of need include the community center, bandshell, lighting, dog park, ADA access, and more. The City secured initial funding of more than \$1 million, but the need exceeds available funding. For a match to the identified funding, the project scope can be expanded with additional improvements made to this heavily used park.
 - Funding Requested: \$1,500,000

- Funding Allocated: \$850,000 in State funding, \$200,000 from City Measure A
 - Project Location: Council District 2
 - Delegation Members: Congressman Garcia, Senator Gonzalez, Assemblymember Lowenthal
- *Drake/Chavez Master Plan Implementation*
 - Project Summary: The Drake Chavez Vision Plan Implementation Project will connect Cesar Chavez Park in Downtown Long Beach (33 acres) and Drake Park (6 acres) in the Willmore City Historic District through the development of 5 acres of former industrial and abandoned railroad property into a new park connection with wetlands, habitat, interpretive signage, and active and passive recreation along the lower LA River. Funding is needed to complete planning, design, and construction of the Drake/Chavez Master Plan to create more usable park space and improve community connectivity. In July 2019, the City Council adopted a Park Vision Plan, which includes an expansion of Drake and Chavez Parks, located in downtown Long Beach. The project would develop an additional 5 acres of parkland connecting Chavez and Drake Parks. The conceptual design for this project has been completed. These parks are in disadvantaged communities with a population of more than 15,000 within a half-mile radius.
 - Funding Requested: \$10,000,000
 - Funding Allocated: \$991,100 from Port of Long Beach, \$300,000 from Los Angeles County RPOSD Measure A, and \$204,695 from Non-Profit Funding for Urban Agricultural Area
 - Project Location: Council District 1
 - Delegation Members: Congressman Garcia, Senator Gonzalez, Assemblymember Lowenthal
- *El Dorado Duck Pond*
 - Project Summary: The scope of work consists of draining the pond, removing sediment, replacing the pond liner, installing a new reclaimed water line and storm drain outlet, repairing the pump house, and upgrades to the existing pump system. In addition, the damaged sidewalk around the pond will be replaced and the parking lot will be improved for ADA accessibility. Lastly, a new forebay and wetland will be constructed to provide additional habitat areas.
 - Funding Requested: \$1,500,000
 - Funding Allocated: \$2,800,000 from Measure W, \$254,000 from Measure A, \$1,117,000 from LBWD Grant, \$300,000 from RPOSD (Prop A), and \$515,184 from General Capital

- Project Location: Council District 4

- *El Dorado Park Universal Playground*
 - Project Summary: This project would remove the current, outdated playground and replace it with a new, universally accessible playground. By installing signature playground equipment that is accessible to all users, this project will increase ADA accessibility through site-work improvements, enhance outdoor recreational opportunities, provide age-appropriate playground structures for ages two to five and ages five to twelve, and promote active and healthy lifestyles. Increased access to parks and recreational opportunities is one of many factors that can improve the quality of life and health outcomes for residents of under-resourced communities.
 - Funding Requested: \$3,000,000
 - Funding Allocated: \$300,000 from City Measure A
 - Project Location: Council District 4
 - Delegation Members: Congressman Garcia, Senator Gonzalez, Assemblymember Lowenthal
- *Hamilton Loop*
 - Project Summary: The Hamilton Loop Project will implement the community's vision that reimagined the embankment along both sides of the SR-91 freeway into a thriving community park space along a two-mile loop extending from Atlantic Ave. to Cherry St. The Hamilton Loop Vision Plan includes landscaping, carbon-sequestering trees, irrigation, lighting, a bioswale parkway, trails, outdoor fitness equipment, gathering spaces with WiFi, passive plazas with benches, chess tables, play equipment, playground climbing wall, dog parks, shaded picnic areas, community gardens, and a native garden. In addition, the design phase will explore the community-supported option of converting the road into a one-way street to accommodate additional park space and a protected bike lane, while maintaining parking on one side of the street.
 - Funding Requested: \$10,000,000
 - Project Location: Council District 9
 - Delegation Members: Congressman Barragan, Senator Gonzalez, Assemblymember Gipson
- *Heartwell Park*
 - Project Summary: This is a Council-approved Measure A project to build an

artificial turf field. Funding would support the project and add a separated running/walking path, with high activity levels at the park.

- Funding Requested: \$3,000,000
 - Funding Allocated: \$2,000,000 from City Measure A Infrastructure Plan for an artificial turf soccer field
 - Project Location: Council District 5
 - Delegation Members: Congressmembers Barragan and Garcia, Senator Gonzalez, Assemblymember Lowenthal
- *Houghton Park Phase II*
 - Project Summary: Based on the 2016 Houghton Park Vision Plan, this project will develop a new community building, full-size turf soccer field with irrigation and spectator seating, new basketball court, refurbish existing courts and fields, renovate a historic building for the Community Center, park promenade with entry monuments, and concrete amphitheater. Located in north Long Beach, the area has a population of 10,837 within a half mile radius of the park. Within the community, there is less than 1 acre of green space per 1,000 residents. This project will improve access to recreation and green space for these residents.
 - Funding Requested: \$36,000,000
 - Project Location: Council District 9
 - Delegation Members: Congressman Barragan, Senator Gonzalez, Assemblymember Gipson
- *LA River Open Space Project*
 - Project Summary: The City is currently working with the County of Los Angeles to lease an 11-acre parcel along the LA River and anticipates beginning a visioning plan process later this year to guide future park development. Any funds allocated to this project would be used to implement the vision plan once it is completed.
 - Funding Requested: \$5,000,000
 - Project Location: Council Districts 5, 7, 8
 - Delegation Members: Congressman Barragan, Senator Gonzalez, Assemblymember Lowenthal
- *Livable West Long Beach Plan*
 - Project Summary: The Drake Park Greenbelt and Improvements was identified as the highest priority within Park Improvements and Expansions in the Livable West Long Beach Plan. The project aims to provide additional open space between Drake Park and the LA River to form the River Link.

- Funding Requested: \$39,000,000
 - Project Location: Council Districts 1, 7
 - Delegation Members: Congressmembers Barragan and Garcia, Senator Gonzalez, Assemblymember Lowenthal
- *MLK Park Vision Plan Implementation*
 - Project Summary: The MLK Jr. Park Vision Plan is currently underway. While the improvements have not yet been finalized, funding allocated to the project would be put towards site improvements and implementation of the plan.
 - Funding Requested: \$5,000,000
 - Project Location: Council District 6
 - Delegation Members: Congressmember Garcia, Assemblymember Lowenthal, Senator Gonzalez
- *North Long Beach Pool*
 - Project Summary: On August 3, 2021, the City Council requested the City Manager to direct the Department of Parks, Recreation and Marine to explore the feasibility of, locations for, and funding options for the construction of a public pool to serve the North Long Beach community. The study identified Ramona Park as the most feasible location, and external funding would support the development of the overall plan, design, and construction of the pool. Funding is needed to support the design and construction of an outdoor community pool at Ramona Park. Building a new pool in North Long Beach would address the City's desire to more equitably distribute resources.
 - Funding Requested: \$10,000,000
 - Project Location: Council District 9
 - Delegation Members: Congressmember Barragan, Senator Gonzalez, Assemblymember Gipson
- *Pickleball Courts*
 - Project Summary: Currently, the City has one dedicated pickleball court at Bayshore Park. Demand has greatly exceeded the use of this single court, however, and the City plans to develop another eight pickleball courts. This project would not only help meet local demand for pickleball space but could also support the City's efforts to prepare for the 2028 Olympic Games, as there has been significant advancement in the formal consideration and designation of pickleball as an Olympic demonstration event for the 2024 Paris Olympics.
 - Funding Requested: \$1,000,000

- *Scherer Park Playground*
 - Project Summary: Install signature playground at Scherer Park to improve and upgrade the playground facilities. Community benefits include: increased ADA accessibility through site-work improvements, enhanced outdoor recreational opportunities, provide age-appropriate playground structures for ages two to five and ages five to twelve, and promotes active and healthy lifestyles.
 - Funding Requested: \$2,000,000
 - Project Location: Council District 8
 - Delegation Members: Congressman Barragan, Senator Gonzalez, Assemblymember Lowenthal
- *Seaside Park Youth Center Feasibility Study*
 - Project Summary: Washington neighborhood has long been a focus for the City's violence prevention efforts, with targeted strategies to engage youth in constructive and preventative programs to assist youth. This area has received priority for the Safe Long Beach Violence Prevention Program and Activating Safe Communities, through a three-year \$1.1 million investment. However, the area has no established community center or physical space for community programming. The City would like to explore the feasibility of establishing a Youth Center in Seaside Park as part of the coordinated violence prevention efforts and is requesting feasibility study funding for further community engagement and concept design to make the City competitive for future grant funding.
 - Funding Requested: \$1,500,000
 - Project Location: Council District 1
 - Delegation Members: Congressman Garcia, Senator Gonzalez, Assemblymember Lowenthal
- *Terminal Island Transition Plan Feasibility and Implementation*
 - Project Summary: The City is working to determine the feasibility of implementing the Terminal Island Transition Plan, which would increase green space along the Terminal Island Freeway. The plan aims to identify options for increasing access to park space in west Long Beach, an area of the city with significantly less access to open space compared to other areas.
 - Funding Requested: \$3,000,000

- Projection Location: Council District 7
- Delegation Members: Congressman Barragan, Senator Gonzalez, Assemblymember Lowenthal
- *Willow Springs Wetlands and Trail Expansion*
 - Project Summary: Willow Springs Park is a 48-acre community park that includes 10-acres of upland restoration, 1-acre of wetlands, 3-acres of park land that was already restored at Longview Point, and 34-acres of undeveloped park space. The project will revitalize open space by using nature-based solutions to capture and treat stormwater. Some of the captured runoff will be used for onsite irrigation. The project will add to the existing trail system, creating additional wetlands, natural habitat, and enhanced biodiversity.
 - Funding Requested: \$9,400,000
 - Funding Allocated: \$1,200,000 from Los Angeles County Measure W
 - Project Location: Council District 5
 - Delegation Members: Congressman Garcia, Senator Gonzalez, Assemblymember Lowenthal

Preparation for 2028 Olympics

- *Belmont Pier*
 - Project Summary: Identified as a priority for the “8 by 28” projects to be completed before the City hosts some of the Olympic Games in 2028, the replacement of the Belmont Pier will serve as a key viewing station for Olympic sailing events and will provide ongoing water recreational opportunities in Long Beach.
 - Funding Requested: \$40,000,000
 - Project Location: Council District 3
 - Delegation Members: Congressman Garcia, Senator Gonzalez, Assemblymember Lowenthal
- *Convention Center*
 - Project Summary: The Long Beach Convention Center has significant facility improvement needs in preparation for the 2028 Olympic Games. These include repairs to critical plumbing, electrical, and structural systems. Replace aging HVAC/air handling units with more energy efficient systems and controls that contain modern air filtration system. Repair existing electrical systems and install additional energy efficiency improvements to help achieve net-zero goals. The project will significantly lower operations and maintenance annual costs.

- Project Location: Council District 1

- *Shoemaker Bridge*
 - Project Summary: This project will replace existing, outdated roadway facilities and construct an iconic bridge that serves as a gateway for Long Beach and the Southern California region. It will provide necessary improvements to safety, operations, and connectivity between Long Beach and regional transportation facilities, and will add 5.5 acres of usable park space and improve local connectivity. This is a critical project in preparation for the 2028 Olympic Games.
 - Funding Requested: \$650,000,000
 - Project Location: Council Districts 1, 7
 - Delegation Members: Congressman Garcia, Senator Gonzalez, Assemblymember Lowenthal

Programming

- *Library Program*
 - Project Summary: This funding would support the development of bilingual early literacy and parental engagement programming at Burnett and Harte Libraries. Furthermore, funding is needed to renovate and expand the African American Resource Area print collection at Burnett Library through additional staffing, furniture upgrades, public programs, and speaker series. Last, Mark Twain AV upgrades are needed for the community room to allow for modern community engagement and educational workshops capabilities.
 - Funding Requested: \$3,000,000
 - Project Location: Council Districts 6, 7
 - Delegation Members: Congressmembers Barragan and Garcia, Assemblymember Lowenthal, Senator Gonzalez
- *Queen Mary: Institute for Historic Preservation*
 - Project Summary: The City is partnering with CSULB, the Museum of Latin American Art (MOLAA), and the Queen Mary Heritage Foundation to develop an institute for the preservation and presentation of over 4,000 artistic artifacts, architecture, and history on the Queen Mary. Funding would support the initial three-year plan to immediately activate project

partners in the establishment of the institute, asset inventory, digital database, and programming.

Water Quality and Storm Protection

- *Alamitos Bay Water Quality: AES Pump System Rebuild*
 - Project Summary: The Alamitos Energy Center is a natural gas power plant that provides electricity to Long Beach and the region. This power generator has used ocean water to cool power plant turbines, but due to State regulatory requirements will have to phase out one-through cooling systems. Funding is needed to decommission existing AES pumps and install new, fish friendly pumps that will maintain water circulation and quality at Alamitos Bay for the benefit of existing and future flora, fauna, and recreational opportunities.
 - Funding Requested: \$5,000,000
 - Project Location: Council District 3
 - Delegation Members: Congressman Garcia, Senator Gonzalez, Assemblymember Lowenthal

- *Naples Seawalls Future Phases*
 - Project Summary: The City has been systematically evaluating and replacing the most urgent seawalls in Naples, which are City infrastructure and provide critical protection to the island. The City has funded and completed the first two phases of the seawalls identified as most in need, at a cost of between \$12 and \$16 million for each phase. The City has set aside an additional \$500,000 in funding this year to update the studies on the additional replacement need and which phase would need to be addressed next and that work is getting underway. Federal or state funding could assist in funding the construction once the evaluation is complete, which is estimated between \$12 and \$15 million.

 - Funding Identified: \$500,000 in Tidelands funding
 - Project Location: Council District 3

- *Peninsula Beach Nourishment Solutions*
 - Project Summary: The City has a long-standing issue of coastal erosion on the peninsula. For many years, the City has trucked in sand from other areas of the beach to the peninsula to address coastal erosion and flooding protection. A more permanent solution is needed to build the beach out and to help keep the sand in place as much as possible. The City is engaged in a study of solutions and has recently set aside additional Tidelands dollars in the amount of \$250,000 to further refine the specific solutions to be proposed. Federal or state funding would be helpful in funding the construction or implementation of a program to build out the beach.
