Re: Response to Emergency Department Services at Community Medical Center (Community)

Dr. Mr. West:

I wanted to follow up on our phone conversation. Again I apologize for not being able to give you advance notice to the Los Angeles County Emergency Medical Services (LACEMS) announcement on the diversion of Advanced Life Support (ALS) patients due to the rapid movement of activities. Moving forward, I look forward to improving our communications as we wind down hospital operations. Importantly, I want to reply to your letter dated March 8 in regards to some particular requests you had of MemorialCare. In the letter, you asked for the following:

- (1) Detail MemorialCare's plan to expand emergency room services at Memorial Hospital for Advanced Life Support (ALS) patients in order to adequately serve patients who can no longer use Community Hospital due to your sudden closure of ALS/paramedic services. We are requesting both a short-term and long-term plan to address this critical community need.
- (2) Immediately provide a private inter-facility transport for walk-in patients or other patients at the hospital who are determined to need ALS care, and require transport to Memorial. It is not acceptable to rely on the Long Beach Fire Department to transport these patients from Community to Memorial as a result of your decision. It is expected that you remedy this.
- (3) Confirm explicitly that Community Hospital will extend the acute and psychiatric care licenses at Community Hospital through April 28, 2019.

Following are detailed responses for each of the items you've requested.

(1) Emergency Services at Long Beach Medical Center:

Conversations began with the Chief of the Long Beach Fire Department about the impact of closing Community's emergency department in November 2017 when Long Beach Medical Center announced to the City that Community could not meet seismic requirements. Since those meetings, Long Beach Medical Center has implemented the following:

Implemented January 2018:

- Implemented an action plan to ensure that paramedic wait time was no more than 45 minutes. To date the goal is being met for less than 45 minute wait time, with an average of 8.9 minutes for ALS patients and 44.4 minutes for Basic Life Support (BLS) patients.
- Opened additional observation beds in an overflow unit on an “as needed” basis to meet patient volume and to ensure emergency department patients needing additional testing and monitoring are seen before a physician decides if they need to be admitted to the hospital or discharged home. *(to date, census has not required the additional beds to be utilized).*
- Emergency Department physicians to perform rapid medical evaluation for downgrades to Fast Track program *(includes patients who are able to sit independently when removed from gurney).*
- Holding two hallway beds exclusively for Long Beach Fire Department for BLS patients when emergency department room is not available or wait time is not meeting agreed upon 45 minutes.
- Increasing emergency department staffing by four registered nurses for the weeks of March 18 through July 3 to assist with the transition process.
- Basic Life Support team to escalate to emergency department team leader when wait time is approaching the agreed upon 45 minutes *(this option will be accessed as needed but to date has not been needed as the goal time of 45 minutes has been met).*

Future Emergency Services Plans:

- Long Beach Medical Center emergency department will be expanded by 10 observation beds. The plan will be approved by the Office of Statewide Health Planning Department (OSHPD) and the additional beds are expected to be operational in November/December next year.
- Thirteen ICU beds within Long Beach Medical Center will come back on line by April 15, 2018, which will expand even more the number of available beds for critical care patients. These beds have been in suspension due to renovations in the hospital.

(2) Inter-facility Transport Plan:

The Los Angeles County Emergency Medical Services (LACEMS) evaluated the circumstances at Community Medical Center and, in the interest of ensuring optimum patient safety and minimizing disruption to the emergency medical services transport system, made the decision to place Community on divert for ALS patients which average about six per day. A copy of our transfer/transport plan for critically ill patients who present at Community is attached.

(3) Acute Care License:

As indicated in our response to the City on March 5, pursuant to your request that we renew the annual licenses of the facility, we are confirming that we will renew the acute care license for Community upon its expiration on April 28, 2018. As a reminder, the licensure renewal is undertaken in the normal course of business and does not impact the need to cease operations at a date much earlier than the end of the next licensure term.

I look forward to our meeting on Thursday, March 22, to discuss the acute care services closure time line and milestones. I would be happy to answer any additional questions you have regarding LACEMS placing Community on diversion for ALS patients.
