I. INTRODUCTION

Title XII of Division A of the American Recovery and Reinvestment Act of 2009 (ARRA), which became effective on February 17, 2009, appropriates \$1 billion to carry out the Community Development block Grant (CDBG) program under Title I of the Housing and Community Development Act of 1974 on an expedited basis. Consequently, HUD has established a new program called the Community Development Block Grant-Recovery (CDBG-R). Under this program the City is eligible to receive \$2,332,444 of federal funding.

In order to receive funds under the Community Development Block Grant (Recovery Act) Program (CDBG-R) enacted as part of the Recovery Act of 2009, the City is required to complete a substantial amendment to the City 2008-09 Action Plan. This proposed amendment will incorporate the CDBG-R funds and implementing requirements the City will use to administer and commit these funds.

The CDBG grant was established as a "brick and mortar" grant to help cities improve housing, public facilities and infrastructure for low-and moderate-income persons. In order for a project to be eligible for CDBG funding, the City is responsible for assuring that each eligible activity meets one of three national objectives:

- Benefit of low-and moderate-income persons;
- ❖ Aid in the prevention or elimination of slums or blight; and
- Meet a need having a particular urgency (referred to as urgent need).

The City proposes that ninety percent (90%) or \$2,099,197, of the CDBG-R funds be made available for infrastructure projects that benefit low and moderate income neighborhoods, projects that can be under construction within 120 days of the release of funds, and projects that assist with job creation and retention objectives of the Recovery Act. The remaining ten percent (10%) of the funds, \$233,244, would be used for the CDBG-R grant administration.

II. Activities

A. Activity Name: Arlington Street/River Avenue Storm Drain

Activity Description: As a result of several flooding incidents that have impacted residents on Arlington Street, including damaging homes and vehicles, the City of Long Beach contracted with the Los Angeles County Department of Public Works, Storm Drain Division, to conduct a drainage study of the area. The report prepared in 2007 concluded that the 60-inch storm drain pipe that collects storm water from the Arlington Street area as well as the adjoining Southern California Edison Company property, and carries these storm water flows to the Dominguez Channel is undersized, providing less than a five-year protection level. The proposed project will bring the flood protection in this area to a full 10-year protection level consists of the construction of a parallel storm drain system on River Avenue just north of Arlington Street connected to an underground storage (detention) basin on the SCE property that would temporarily hold two acre feet of storm water during heavy flows and then release them as the storm abates and the downstream pipe is no longer flowing full. The project consists of the following elements:

- Construction of 1021 feet of 48 inch reinforced concrete pipe in River Avenue from Arlington Street to Wardlow Road;
- Modification of five street level catch basins on River Avenue including the installation of trash and bacteria filters:
- Construction of six new street level catch basins on River Avenue including the installation of trash and bacteria filters;
- Construction of a detention system consisting of five 84-inch corrugated metal pipes, each 430 feet in length, to be located within a dedicated easement on property owned by the Southern California Edison Company (SCE) in order to retain two acre feet of storm drain flows;
- Modification of a surface inlet on SCE's property with a debris deflector;
 and

• Construction of connecting pipes from the existing storm drain system to the detention system.

As a condition of CDBG-R funding, HUD requires compliance with Title XII of Division A and Section 1602. Title XII of Division A gives priority to projects that can award contracts based on bids within 120 days from the date the funds are made available to the recipients. Section 1602 gives preference to projects and activities that can be started and completed expeditiously and notes a goal of obligating at least 50% of the funds not later than June 17, 2009.

The projects selected to receive CDBG-R funds meet the above-mentioned requirement as follows:

The Arlington Street/River Avenue Storm Drain Project design phase has been completed and the contract will commence as soon as CDBG-R grant agreements are executed.

The Sidewalk Program has an inventory of sidewalk replacement projects in CDBG eligible neighborhoods. The contract will commence as soon as CDBG-R grant agreements are executed.

The Sidewalk Program will assist with job retention and creation and generate economic benefits. The project will preserve jobs and livelihoods for classifications of workers adversely impacted by the recent economic downturn: construction workers and laborers and construction material suppliers. The project is anticipated to create up to 8 new jobs. More indirect jobs may also be created/retained as a result of the purchase of the construction materials from area vendors.

The activity will also reduce blight and create long-term infrastructure benefit by replacing deteriorated sidewalks in low/moderate income neighborhoods.

Description of how activity will achieve above items:

The project design calls for a drain insert that is intended to capture trash and bacteria that would otherwise end up in the Los Angeles River. The Arlington Area has been subject to flooding for the last 20 years creating large amounts of water-soaked trash and debris. The proposed project will provide flood protection for up to a ten-year rain event, which will drastically reduce the amount of flood damaged trash and debris going to area landfills.

Description of how activity will achieve above items:

The project is "smart growth" in that it provides newer and pedestrian-friendly sidewalks that may encourage area residents to walk to nearby local businesses for their regular errands, hence reducing shorter car trips that, in turn, will reduce pollution emissions.

All CDBG-R funded activities that generate construction debris will comply with the City's Construction and Demolition Debris Recycling program (C&D) and Waste Management Plan (WMP). The City has, in response to Statemandated waste reduction goals and as part of the City's commitment to sustainable development, adopted an ordinance that requires certain demolition and/or construction projects to divert at least 60% of waste either through recycling, salvage, or deconstruction.



CERTIFICATIONS

- (1) Affirmatively furthering fair housing. The jurisdiction will affirmatively further fair housing, which means that it will conduct an analysis to identify impediments to fair housing choice within the jurisdiction, take appropriate actions to overcome the effects of any impediments identified through that analysis, and maintain records reflecting the analysis and actions in this regard.
- (2) Anti-displacement and relocation plan. Employers of convicted employees must provide notice, including position title, to every grant officer or other designee on whose grant activity the convicted employee was working, unless the Federal agency has designated a central point for the receipt of such notices. Notice shall include the identification number(s) of each affected grant;
 - 6. Taking one of the following actions, within 30 calendar days of receiving notice under subparagraph 4(b), with respect to any employee who is so convicted:

- (4) Anti-lobbying. To the best of the jurisdiction's knowledge and belief:
 - 1. No Federal appropriated funds have been paid or will be paid, by or on behalf of it, to any person for influencing or attempting to influence an officer or employee of any agency, a Member of Congress, an officer or employee of Congress, or an employee of a Member of Congress in connection with the awarding of any Federal contract, the making of any Federal grant, the making of any Federal loan, the entering into of any cooperative agreement, and the extension, continuation, renewal, amendment, or modification of any Federal contract, grant, loan, or cooperative agreement;
 - 2. If any funds other than Federal appropriated funds have been paid or will be paid to any person for influencing or attempting to influence an officer or employee of any agency, a Member of Congress, an officer or employee of Congress, or an employee of a Member of Congress in connection with this Federal contract, grant, loan, or cooperative agreement, it will complete and submit Standard Form-LLL, "Disclosure Form to Report Lobbying," in accordance with its instructions; and
 - 3. It will require that the language of paragraph 1 and 2 of this anti-lobbying certification be included in the award documents for all subawards at all tiers (including subcontracts, subgrants, and contracts under grants, loans, and cooperative agreements) and that all subrecipients shall certify and disclose accordingly.
- (5) Authority of Jurisdiction. The jurisdiction possesses the legal authority to carry out the programs for which it is seeking funding, in accordance with applicable HUD regulations and other program requirements.
- (6) Consistency with Plan. The housing activities to be undertaken with CDBG-R funds are consistent with its consolidated plan.
- (7) Section 3. The jurisdiction will comply with section 3 of the Housing and Urban Development Act of 1968 (12 U.S.C. 1701u), and implementing regulations at 24 CFR part 135.
- (8) Community development plan. The jurisdiction certifies that the consolidated housing and community development plan identifies housing and community development needs and specifies both short-term and long-term community development objectives that have been developed in accordance with the primary objective of the statute authorizing the CDBG program.
- (9) Following a plan. The jurisdiction is following a current consolidated plan that has been approved by HUD.
- (10) Use of funds. The jurisdiction has developed activities so as to give the maximum feasible priority to activities that will benefit low- and moderate-income families or aid in the prevention of slums or blight. Additional activities may be included that are designed to meet other community development needs having particular urgency because existing conditions pose a serious and immediate threat to the health or welfare of the community where other financial resources are not available to meet such needs It has complied with the following criteria:

- Maximum Feasible Priority. With respect to activities expected to be assisted with CDBG-R funds, it certifies that it has developed its Action Plan so as to give maximum feasible priority to activities which benefit low and moderate income families or aid in the prevention or elimination of slums or blight. The Action Plan may also include activities which the grantee certifies are designed to meet other community development needs having a particular urgency because existing conditions pose a serious and immediate threat to the health or welfare of the community, and other financial resources are not available);
- 2. Special Assessments. The jurisdiction will not attempt to recover any capital costs of public improvements assisted with CDBG-R funds by assessing any amount against properties owned and occupied by persons of low- and moderate-income, including any fee charged or assessment made as a condition of obtaining access to such public improvements. However, if CDBG-R funds are used to pay the proportion of a fee or assessment attributable to the capital costs of public improvements (assisted in part with CDBG-R funds) financed from other revenue sources. an assessment or charge may be made against the property with respect to the public improvements financed by a source other than CDBG-R funds. The jurisdiction will not attempt to recover any capital costs of public improvements assisted with CDBG-R funds, unless CDBG-R funds are used to pay the proportion of fee or assessment attributable to the capital costs of public improvements financed from other revenue sources. In this case, an assessment or charge may be made against the property with respect to the public improvements financed by a source other than CDBG-R funds. In addition, with respect to properties owned and occupied by moderate-income (but not low-income) families, an assessment or charge may be made against the property with respect to the public improvements financed by a source other than CDBG-R funds if the jurisdiction certifies that it lacks CDBG-R or CDBG funds to cover the assessment.
- (11) Excessive Force. The jurisdiction certifies that it has adopted and is enforcing: (1) a policy prohibiting the use of excessive force by law enforcement agencies within its jurisdiction against any individuals engaged in non-violent civil rights demonstrations; and (2) a policy of enforcing applicable State and local laws against physically barring entrance to or exit from a facility or location that is the subject of such non-violent civil rights demonstrations within its jurisdiction.
- (12) Compliance with anti-discrimination laws. The CDBG-R grant will be conducted and administered in conformity with title VI of the Civil Rights Act of 1964 (42 U.S.C. 2000d), the Fair Housing Act (42 U.S.C. 3601-3619), and implementing regulations.
- (13) Compliance with lead-based paint procedures. The activities concerning lead-based paint will comply with the requirements of part 35, subparts A, B, J, K, and R of this title.
- (14) Compliance with laws. The jurisdiction will comply with applicable laws.
- (15) Compliance with ARRA. The jurisdiction will comply with Title XII of Division A of the American Recovery and Reinvestment Act of 2009.
- (16) Project selection. The jurisdiction will select projects to be funded, by giving priority to projects that can award contracts based on bids within 120 days from the date the funds are made available to the recipient, and that will ensure maximum job creation and economic benefit.
- (17) Timeliness of infrastructure investments. When the jurisdiction uses CDBG-R funds for infrastructure investments, the grantee will give preference to quick-start and finish activities, including a goal to use at least 50 percent of the funds for activities within 120 days of enactment of the Recovery Act.

- (18) Buy American provision. The jurisdiction will ensure that all iron, steel and manufactured goods used in construction, alteration, repair, or maintenance of a public building or public work project assisted with CDBG-R funds under the Recovery Act must be produced in the United States unless the Secretary finds that: (1) the requirement is inconsistent with public interest; (2) those goods are not reasonably available or produced in sufficient quantity in the U.S.; (3) or the use of the goods will increase the project cost by more than 25 percent.
- (19) Appropriate use of funds for infrastructure investments. The Governor, mayor, or other chief executive, as appropriate certifies, that any infrastructure investments have received the full review and vetting required by law and that the chief executive accepts responsibility that the infrastructure investment is an appropriate use of taxpayer dollars. Alternatively, a grantee's chief elected official certifies that infrastructure investments will receive the full review and vetting required by law and that the chief executive accepts responsibility that the infrastructure investment is an appropriate use of taxpayer dollars.
- (20) 70% of CDBG-R for LMI. The aggregate use of CDBG-R funds shall principally benefit persons of low and moderate income in a manner that ensures that at least 70 percent of the grant is expended for activities that benefit such persons over the life of the CDBG-R grant.
